The Office of the Children's eSafety Commissioner (the Office) is committed to helping young people have safe, positive experiences online.

We promote online safety education for Australian young people, through our [classroom resources](#), [Outreach Program](#) and [Voluntary Certification Scheme](#).

We also provide a complaints service for young Australians who experience [serious cyberbullying](#), and for [reporting illegal online content](#).

[eSafetyWomen](#) is another important arm of our program—empowering Australian women to take control of their online experiences. eSafetyWomen is a key part of the Australian Government's [Women's Safety Package to Stop the Violence](#).

At the Office, all resources and services are underpinned by our evidence-based [research](#) into internet use, online safety, e-security and other related issues.

How we help young people

We help young people stay safe online by providing a range of fun and interactive programs and teaching resources. These resources and programs help young people take control of their online safety, have respectful relationships online, and know where to go to get support.

We help young people who experience serious cyberbullying by working to remove the material from the social media service on which it appeared. We also help young people find further support, and provide advice and strategies on how to deal with these issues.

Our youth program, [Rewrite Your Story](#), empowers young people to consider, converse and take action about cyberbullying.

We aim to make the internet a safer place by removing illegal content, in particular online child sexual abuse material. We work with our international partners and law enforcement to prioritise removal of this material, which usually happens in less than three days.

How we help parents

We help parents navigate the ever-changing connected world and promote online safety by providing information through our online resource hub iParent. [iParent](#) is full of information about online risks, issues and other useful advice around e-security and parental controls.

We also provide up-to-date, critical information that parents need to know about the latest online trends and services their kids are using, including advice on age restrictions, privacy settings and costs.
